- 603. Three Distinct Cuts of Australian Natives - in flower (not exceeding 2ft). Prize money donated by Glenn Robertson.
- 604. One Camellia on a Saucer.
- 605. One cut of Bearded Iris - Light Shade.
- 606. One cut of Bearded Iris - Dark Shade
- 607. Three cuts of Distinct Foliage.

TIPS FOR ENTERING FLOWERS

- **Make sure all blooms and foliage are free from spots/blemishes.**
- **When entering roses, snip any other rose buds off that surround the main bloom.**
- **Cut flowers late evening or early morning to prevent stress on plant.**
